UPCOMING EVENTS AT COOK FOREST STATE PARK

FRIENDS OF COOK FOREST SPONSORED EVENTS

Sunday, October 7 at 1:00 - A Walk in Penn's Woods: Please join the Friends of Cook Forest as we take a guided hike led by one of our "Friends" or a member of our Cook Forest State Park staff. We will hike the Cook Trail which was recently renovated with the goal of getting ready for this event and educating all who walk this trail. Every county in the state will have a represented trail for this event organized by Penn State. The hike is under 2 miles, is fairly easy to moderate, and should take less than two hours.

Saturday, September 15 at 7:00pm - "Cathedral: The fight to Save the Ancient Hemlocks of Cook Forest". All organizations involved with Cook Forest State Park will be on hand for a "town Hall" type forum to answer questions and give information about the state of Cook Forest State Park and the plight of the HWA along with the viewing of this beautiful 20 minute documentary. The HD short film, produced by Wild Excellence Films, is about the ancient hemlock trees of Cook Forest which are under attack from the hemlock woolly adelgid, a destructive invasive insect that threatens the Eastern Hemlock's existence. This event will take place at the Sawmill Center for the arts in the Sawmill Theater. The cost is \$15. All proceeds will go to the fight to save the hemlocks.

THE COOK FOREST CONSERVANCY SPONSORED EVENT

Sunday, September 16 at 10:00 am - "Twilight of the Hemlocks & Beeches": Join the Cook Forest Conservancy for breakfast in the woods, featuring a slideshow by ecologist and author, Tim Palmer, featuring his new book. This will take place at Pavilion #2 by Tom's Run. It is free, but RSVP is required to kelly@cookforestconservancy.org

Wednesday September 26 at 5:30pm - Save your Trees & save money: Join forestry insect experts for a practical field seminar covering how and when to treat for Hemlock Woolly Adelgid, and with what. Meet at pavilion #1.

Saturday, September 15 at 1:00pm - "Fire Tower Historical Tour" Historical or Fire Tower #9 conducted by park volunteers Kelley & Al Bilotto. Take a breathtaking view from the box at the very top of the Fire Tower and learn how it operated. The top of the tower will be open from 1:00-3:00pm. (2 hrs)

Saturday September 22 at 7:30pm - "Cathedral by Candlelight". Walk back in time with us into the depths of the Forest Cathedral with an historical character from the past by candlelight. Meet at the Log Cabin Inn Environmental Learning Classroom. Refreshments will be served. Bring your flashlights. (1.5hrs)

Saturday, September 29 at 9:00am - Wilderness Survival: Primitive Fire Building & Meal Preparation - Meet at the Log Cabin Inn Learning Classroom to learn various fire starting techniques. We will then prepare our lunch and car pool to the Black Bear Trail area to use our new found fire starting skills to cook our lunch. Cost is \$25 due upon registration by 9/26. WATCH OUT HWA. WE'RE ON YOUR TAIL!

More than fifty years ago the Hemlock Woolley Adelgid native to Asia, was first spotted in the U.S. near Richmond, VA. Since then, this invasive pest has destroyed the majority of the Eastern Hemlocks in the Shenandoah Mountains and the Great Smokey Mountains. Five years ago the HWA was discovered in the largest and oldest stand of Eastern Hemlocks left in the Eastern United States, our own Cook Forest State Park. The Park staff has been working hard to try to save these ancient hemlocks in what has been proclaimed as a National Natural Landmark. The park service has been using pesticides, the introduction of an HWA egg eating beetle, and manpower (including Friends of Cook Forest volunteers), searching through Cook Forest State Park to find where this pest has infested. Through the Friends of Cook Forest newsletter we will keep you up-to-date on the progress protecting Cook Forest State Park's treasured Eastern Hemlocks.

A series of amazing events to help combat the Hemlock Woolley Adelgid are scheduled to take place this fall in Cook Forest State Park. All eyes are on our state park to see how we plan on winning the fight against this invasive species. Please consider attending these events, if you can. Not only will you learn and spread the word on what us, as the human race, can do to reverse the effects that this changing world has had on our native flora and fauna, but your attendance will show that this is an important issue to residents and visitors of this great state. The bigger buzz that is out there, the bigger the support from the state. The "Save the Hemlock"s campaign has three major events that are listed on our events page. The screening of the documentary "Cathedral: The Fight to Save the Ancient Hemlocks of Cook Forest" will take place Saturday September 15th. The next morning, Author and ecologist, Tim Palmer, will discuss our forests fate in his book "Twilight of the Hemlocks & Beeches" on Sunday the 16th. Then Wednesday the 26th, an active workshop will teach all how to combat the HWA in your own yard.

Cook Trail to be Featured in: “A Walk in Penn’s Woods”

Did you know that the Cook Trail has a tree that is actually two, an Eastern white pine and a Northern Red Oak that just happened to grow together? Or that the trail has a Chestnut tree that died during the chestnut blight in the 1920's, but a large part of the tree is still standing because the wood is so durable. See these amazing marvels and many more sights as you read about them on the Cook Trail during “A Walk in Penn’s Woods” on Sunday October 7th.

The “Friends of Cook Forest”, member, Carl Harting, brought up the idea of restoring the old trail at a CFC meeting earlier this year. How awesome would it be to post new signs and restore the old information that could no longer be read along the trail. So with a lot of behind the scenes work with the state park service and other CFC members, the gang got everything ready for volunteer work day in August. A great group showed up to help out and we got the job done. And great timing. Because we were asked by the Penn State organizers of “A Walk in Penn’s Woods” if we had a trail that we might like to feature, on their walk day, October 7th. We said, “Boy, Do we ever.” And we hopped on the band wagon.

The “Walk in Penn’s Woods” goal is to have an organized group hike, educationally led, in every Pennsylvania county that Sunday, October 7th. And the purpose of this walk is so that others may learn about the many ways that the Penn’s Woods works for all of us.

Each walk around the state is unique, but most walks are a bit like a field trip, where you can learn from people who manage, own and and study forests. You can take a closer look at the woods around you and better understand the function and behavior of these systems.

The Friends of Cook Forest will have someone to lead the walk at 1:00pm on Sunday October 7th to elaborate on the information that is already posted, and to give additional interesting tidbits of knowledge. But our main objective in doing this project is that families and parents and grandparents can take their kids on this trail, and they can help plant the seed of loving the forest into these someday adults. For these children will be the future generations that will tend to and protect our beautiful public and private lands and its species.

We also have some older history along the trail like an old 1930's CCC dynamite shed, that was built so the roof would merely blow off in case of an explosion. Now who can beat that. There's something for everyone.
